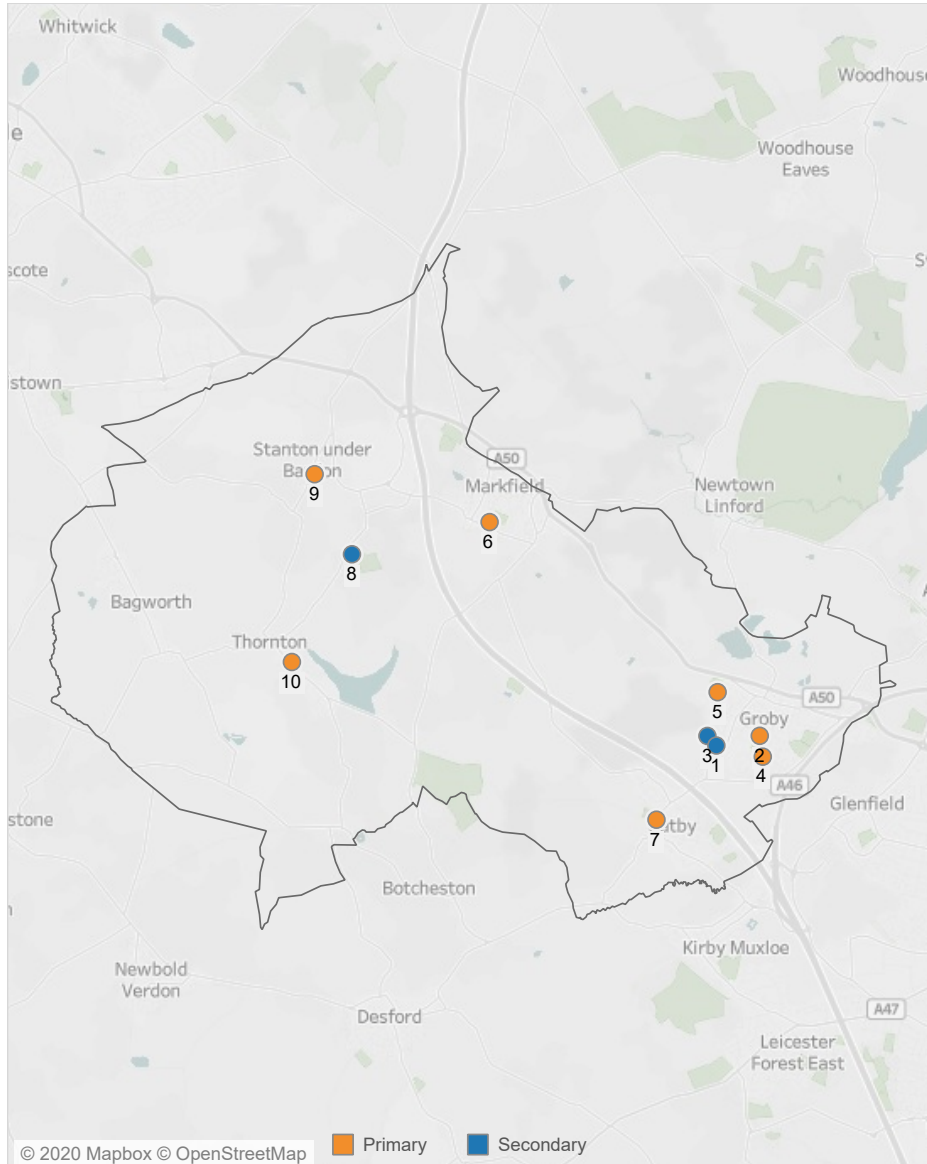


School Health Profile 2018/19

Key Statistics

The health of people in Hinckley and Bosworth is varied compared with the England average. About 11% (1,900) of children live in low income families.

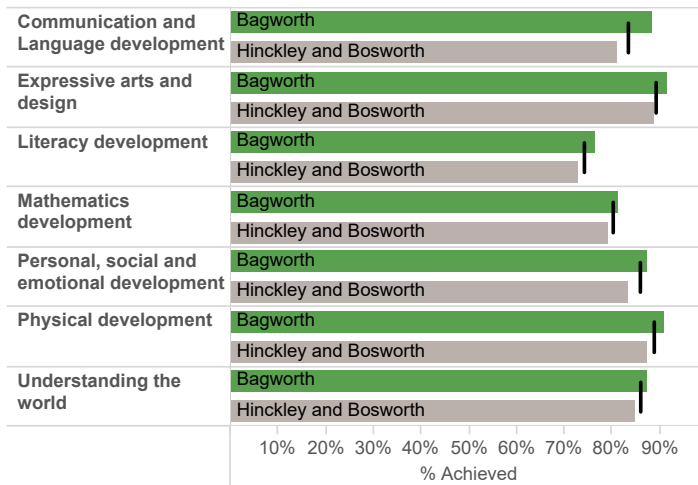
- * Deprivation is lower than average in Hinckley and Bosworth and life expectancy for both men and women is better than the England average.
- * The cluster has 7 primary and 3 secondary schools. 3930 pupils attend these schools and 50.1% are female.
- * The modelled percentage of pupils at age 5 achieving a good level of development in the cluster is similar to the England average.
- * In Reception, 182 children were classified as overweight or obese. In Year 6, this rises to 201 children (2015/16 - 17/18 collective).

School Readiness

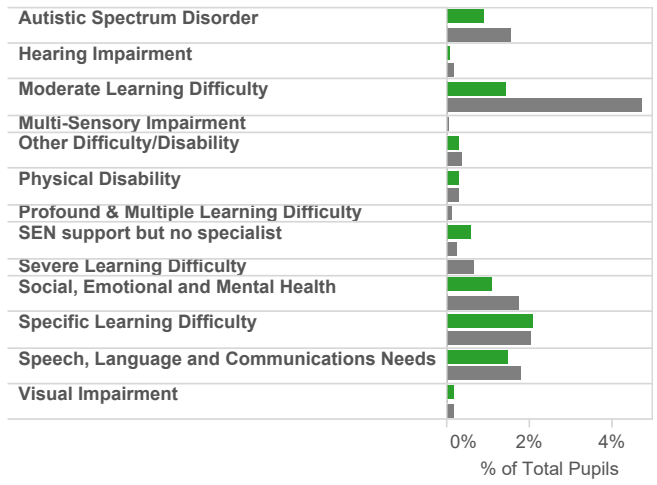
School readiness is a measure of how prepared a child is to succeed in school, cognitively, socially and emotionally. Just as there is an achievement gap in school performance, there is a school readiness gap that separates disadvantaged children from their more affluent peers.

SEN Primary Need reflects the predominant need of each pupil. This is therefore a good indicator of the SEN provision requirements in your area.

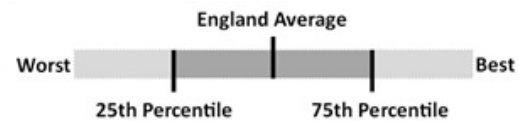

Child Health Summary for Bagworth
