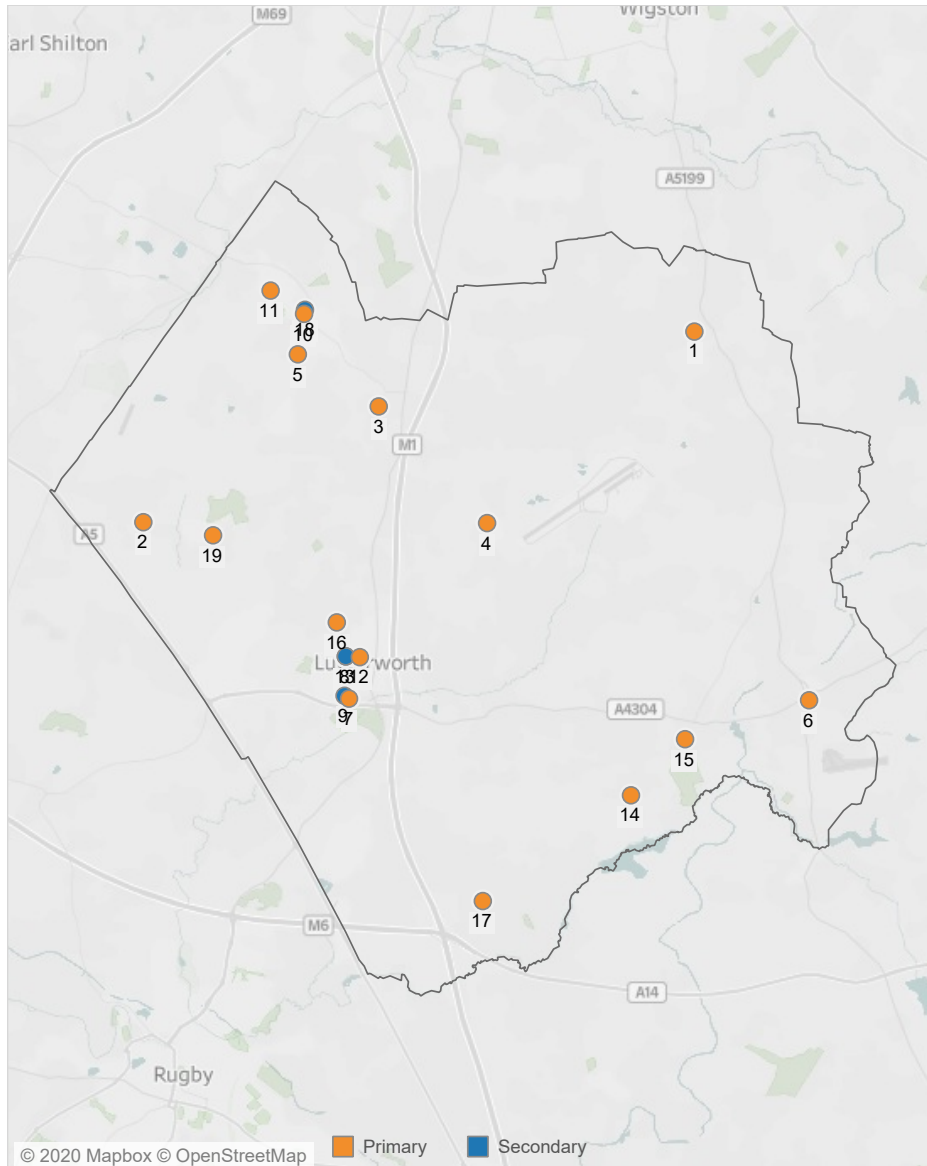


# School Health Profile 2018/19

### Key Statistics

The health of people in Harborough is generally better than the England average. Harborough is one of the 20% least deprived districts/unitary authorities in England, however about 7% (1,000) of children live in low income families.

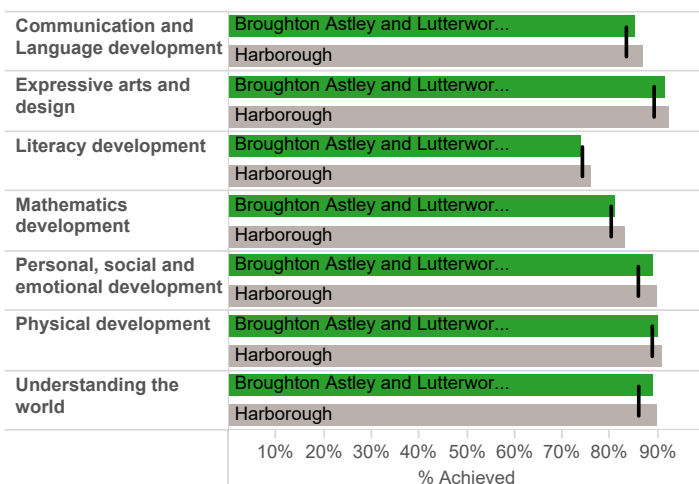
- \* Deprivation is lower than average in Harborough and life expectancy for both men and women is better than the England average.
- \* The cluster has 15 primary and 4 secondary schools. 5495 pupils attend these schools and 52% are male.
- \* The modelled percentage of pupils at age 5 achieving a good level of development in the cluster is similar to the England average.
- \* In Reception, 196 children were classified as overweight or obese. In Year 6, this rises to 268 children (2015/16 - 17/18 collective).

## School Readiness

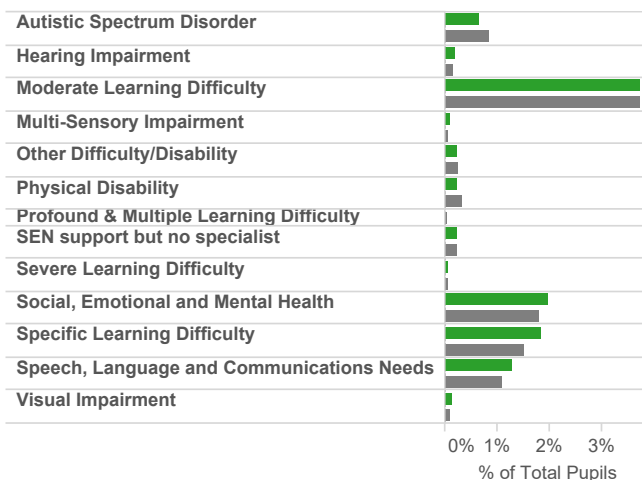
School readiness is a measure of how prepared a child is to succeed in school, cognitively, socially and emotionally. Just as there is an achievement gap in school performance, there is a school readiness gap that separates disadvantaged children from their more affluent peers.

## Child Health Summary for Broughton Astley and Lutterworth
